Term Break and the School Grounds

Over the holidays there will be a range of works being completed in the buildings and grounds.

These include

- Mowing and extensive weed spraying. Please observe signage and area closure.
- The next Sunday Crew is Sunday, September 20th and the grounds will be closed.
- The concrete pad outside the bike shed will be widened.
 This is being funded by Darebin Council for the work we do supporting bike riding in our local area.
- The doors to the Learning Centre will be fixed. This is a major job and will be taking several days.
- School clean including a carpet clean in both buildings.
- Preparation will begin for the installation of the lift to the main building.
- Repairs will be done on the gas furnace in the basement.
- Installation on a new P.A. and phone system will begin.
- Garden group activities will continue.

We plan these activities for times when the school is closed such as holidays and weekends to minimise the risk to others. The delivery of materials, access for large equipment, spraying of pesticide and weedicide all carry a level of risk and risk assessments are completed for these activities. Please do not assume that the grounds are always a safe and risk free place for families to be. As they are open grounds there are also the constant hazards created by broken glass, vandalism, unwanted visitors and other items created through open public access to the space.

Please make sure the grounds are open and safe for your children to use and observe all signage.

There is a huge increase in funding for education and there is much talk about the new Equity funding that was announced to schools yesterday.

The new Equity Funding, from 2016 onwards, takes into account:

the number of enrolled students targeted by the new social disadvantage loadings (determined by parental occupation and education backgrounds of individual students)

the concentration of disadvantage in a school – measured by the Student Family Occupation and Education Index

the number of enrolled students targeted by the new catch up loading (secondary schools only)

the type of school (primary, secondary, special or a language school).

Bell Primary School will be receiving \$9832. We will allocate this funding as we develop our school improvement focus areas for the 2016 Annual Implementation Plan.



Congratulations to the students on all their hard work during eSmart week!















During Term 3, boys in Grade 4–6 were given the chance to further develop their leadership skills by participating in boys club.




I would like to congratulate all mentors and the participants for a successful term of work. I hope you all had fun taking part in Boys' Club.
