ANZAC Unit 2014

I have begun planning the 2014 ANZAC Unit as a lead up to the Centennial of WW1. All students from Grade 1 - 6 will engage in a cross curriculum unit as a central theme at the school for term 1 in 2014.

It will possibly include

- Studies in the history of WW1 specifically relating to the Preston community
- Research into the history behind the school's avenue of honour and registering our Avenue on the current Avenue register website project
- A community art project to develop an art work describing the Avenue and it's purpose
- Children will take part in the 5000 Poppy project lead by a staff member who is a member of the Legacy community (each poppy to commemorate fallen family members) (http://5000poppies.wordpress.com/tag/poppy/)
- Engaging with Darebin Library and the Preston RSL (guest speakers, research, memorabilia etc)

All grades will visit the Shrine and take part in their Spirit of ANZAC education program.

A community day inviting past students, parents, local MP's and others (including local press) to commemorate our history in Preston. This will include period dressing up and activities. It will include a special service for ANZAC day.

Our Assistant Principal heads to China for a study tour of Chinese Education.







2013 Principal Study Tour China

The Overseas Chinese Affairs Office of Shanghai Municipal People's Government invited a delegation of principals from schools in Victoria to visit primary and secondary schools in Shanghai to get to know the education system, culture and environment and to establish a bridge between the principals and fellow educators in Shanghai. Xin Jin Shan Chinese Language & Culture School Inc. who conducts Mandarin lessons after school on Wednesdays at Bell P.S was selected as the only Chinese Culture Promotion Centre in Australia and was given the opportunity to help organize this trip.

During the week we visited Shanghai American International School, three primary schools and a middle school. We were very warmly welcomed in each of the schools and after introductory sessions and discussions with the principal and senior teachers we toured each of the schools. The schools were very honoured to be chosen to present to the delegation and prepared displays of culThere was a very strong emphasis on what we would call extra-curricula activities with a high value being attributed to educating the mind, spirit and body. These activities are integrated into the regular curriculum and often have professional teachers in their field of expertise come into the schools to conduct sessions.

We also had an opportunity to visit many landmarks in Shanghai and Wuxi, including Yu Garden and Old Shanghai Street, Shanghai Museum, Children's Palace, Oriental Pearl Tower and Revolving Restaurant, the Bund and Nanjing Road.

This was a wonderful opportunity for principals to develop professional relationships between our schools as we all share the Mandarin language teaching provided by Xin Jin Shan. While learning a few Mandarin phrases, I feel inspired to learn more of the language and participate in further exchanges and sharing of ideas.




Movember is back and in 2013 we are taking to the streets, inspiring change, motivating others to join the good fight.

YCDI: CONFIDENCE

Confident young children are not afraid to make mistakes when learning something new. They believe that they will be successful if they try hard. They only ask for their parent's or teacher's help when they have tried their very best. Confident young children are

not afraid to meet new classmates. They expect to be liked and make friends. When someone wants them to do something they don't want to do, (break a rule) confident children tell them nicely what they want to do. Confident young children make themselves big and tall and speak in a voice that everyone can hear but is not too loud or yelling.

EXAMPLES OF CONFIDENT BEHAVIOUR IN CHILDREN

- 1. Choose to participate in a new activity with new friends.
- 2. Shares what happened during the day with his/her parents. Clearly outlining the events.
- 3. Introduces himself/herself to someone new.

- 4. Speaks loudly enough so people can hear them clearly
- 5. Does a new 3 activity without first asking for help.
- 6. Participate in all class activities without worrying about what others may think.

WAYS TO PRAISE YOUR CHILD FOR CONFIDENT BEHAVIOUR

- "That took confidence."
- "You were brave to do that all by yourself."
- "Good for you. You were not afraid of trying something new."
- "You see, we all make mistakes when we are learning something new."

TEACH YOUR CHILD THE FOLLOWING CONFIDENT THINKING

o ACCEPTING MYSELF I am likeable and good at doing many things

o TAKING RISKS It is ok to make mistakes when

learning something new or practising

o BEING INDEPENDENT it is good for me to try new activities by myself and its ok to ask for help if I need it.

Over the past few months I have been completing a DEECD Northern Metropolitan project 'Teaching and Learning in the 21st Century'. The professional development was made up of two face to face PD's as well as monthly Webinars where all participants and coaches have discussed projects and technology in an online forum.


I am a member of the 'Collaborate 2' group. Having used ePals on several occasions over the past 5 years gave me the idea to run a project with my current students. At present they have been emailing other students at a school in Italy and this is when I noticed a new project initiative being run by ePals called 'Jump into ePals'. This gave me the idea that this was the perfect opportunity to run with this as part of my project for Teaching and Learning in the 21st Century.

Jump into ePals is an introductory project, led by ePals Staff. The goal of Jump into ePals is to familiarize teachers and students with what there is to do on ePals. We will learn how to navigate the site, how to create and join projects, and how to share student work. We will also meet 11 other classrooms from around the world, making it easy to find a partner for future projects.


Jump into ePals will be conducted in a Project Workspace – an online virtual classroom. Schools we will be collaborating with worlwide include – 5 from America, 2 from Canada, 1 each from Italy, Pakistan, India and New Zealand and 1 from Australia ~ Yes! Grade 3/40.

Today's session was an introductory session where students navigated around the site to see what was on offer. Needless to say, the Games section appealed to some while others created animated machines. They also posted a comment into the Project Workspace student forum. Once others come on board during the week they will see our comments as we will see theirs and hence the communication commences. The project will run for a month. More posts to come.


