

Well, we went to the ASRC to give Izzy's birthday money. There was this sculpture made of wood, and a woman holding a baby and they were wrapped in barbed wire and I think this was about refugees being in detention centres.

The centre's emblem is a white bird flying in front of a gate and I think the bird represents peace and the gate represents all the people waiting.

At first we met up with someone called Jo and she gave us a tour. She showed us some places like the place people can get things and the health centre. We learnt lots of stuff like they have a food shop there for members, and they use points to get food and some stuff is 5 points and some stuff is free but they don't need things like baked beans and tinned spaghetti because members don't eat stuff like that in their own culture.

At the start of the tour, Jo took us to the window and showed us this little two-storey house across the road and she said, "So this is where we started. We were on the bottom floor. We were very small at that time, then we grew a bit more and we moved to the second floor. Then we moved to the city but that was a bit too far away and we were so lucky to find this great place and now we have all these things and areas".

They have a cooking centre like real chefs, and it smells absolutely delicious. It gets really busy around 12 o'clock because all the members come there for lunch. They feed about 200 people every day. There's people there (volunteers) who cook all the food for the members, because the members don't have money to buy food because they've had to leave their own countries but aren't allowed to work here and they really want to.

They've got a health centre which is like the children's' hospital

sea snail. There's a mouse cage and a big shelf of fluffy toys, and refugees who come there are called members.

Developing your child's social media scripts

As parents we teach our kids to talk politely and clearly so that they know how to speak to others when we're not around. In effect, we give our kids social scripts to fall back on when they talk to friends, teachers and relatives. There's no guarantee they'll look an adult in the eye when they speak to them, but our discussions, reminders and lessons about manners will hopefully hold up when we're not around.

The same applies to social media. Our conversations and lessons will prepare them to be savvy users when we're not around. Here are some ideas to get you started:

- 1. "Is this worth posting?" The relatively impersonal nature of social media means that we can post information and pictures with relative immunity. Also its immediacy means that we can do so without much thought. This means that kids need to be very critical about what they see online. 'Is this accurate?' and 'Is this worth posting?' are two valid questions children can ask when they read posts placed by others.
- 2. "Have you taken a big breath?" A child who blurts out everything that comes into his mind without thinking is sure to put plenty of people offside. 'Think before you speak' is the type of message that every child should have in mind. The same applies to social media. Just because they think something doesn't mean they post it. 'Take a big breath' may just about be the most important message to give your kids about social media.
- 3. "Do you want your principal/grandmother/grandfather to see this?!" An invitation to a teenage birthday party posted on social media is one way to get more attendees than you bargained for! The viral nature of social media means that kids should only post messages and photos that they want to be spread and read by a large audience.
- 4. "How does this post make you feel?" We need to teach kids that not every post needs to be commented upon and not every thought needs to be shared, particularly when they are angry. Teaching them to walk a<mark>way and then to step b</mark>ack i<mark>n when</mark> they've calmed down is perhaps the most important communication lesson of all. It is very relevant to social media as emotions are often the last thing on many people's minds when they haphazardly post a message.
- 5. "How will you fix this?" Social media just like any social space requires kids to behave ethically and with kindness. When kids overstep the mark and post hurtful things then it's fair that they fix their mistakes, and apologise. It's reasonable that we teach our children to act with tolerance and with empathy online, and if mean things are posted then they should be expected to try to repair relationships through social media, just as they should offline.
