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So here we are at the end of another very successful school year here at Bell Primary School.

At the end of every year we complete the Annual Implementation Plan (AIP) setting goals and targets for the following year based on the analysis of our NAPLAN, AusVels assessments and other relevant data sets and the four year targets set in the 2012 Strategic Plan. The school leadership team have conducted an in depth analysis of our 2014 data and the AIP and the Annual Report will be shared with the community in the new year.

One of the highlights this year has been the success of the Fundraising Committee. At the beginning of the year the fundraising money from 2013 was used to install the artificial turf on the south oval. This has proven to be such a valuable addition to our grounds and makes a remarkable difference to Tom's P.E. program. After a few hiccoughs the shade sail is being installed on the north side of the Learning Centre using the 2013 funds. There have been many successful events this year - the fabulous Las Vegas Trivia night, the mother's and father's day stalls and the hugely successful Funday. The grand total for this year is \$55 000 approximately which is an all time record. The community survey was completed earlier this term and the top 4 items are being costed and quotes drawn up at the moment. Early next year we will see shade cloth on the northern play equipment, blinds and shelving in the classrooms and plans drawn up for more seating in the play ground. A special thanks goes to everyone involved in all the fundraising events.

I would like to congratulate our School Council on what has been a challenging but satisfying 2013. Our parent members are Nicole Lord, Andrew Vincent, Kelly Soule, Andrew Wilson, Shelley Baulch, Glen Dunstone and Marty Pike. Thank you on behalf of Rod, Marg and myself as the DEECD council members for being such a pleasure to work with. We are well placed to lead our school to a bigger and brighter 2015. At our last meeting we discussed the after school extra curricular programs for 2015, approval of the Qkr app for parent use and the fundraising results.

Jamil Fahour: For showing great leadership when working with the grade one students.


Max Hamilton: For showing great leadership when working with the grade one students.

The festive season could provide the opportunity to develop a sense of 'other' in your children and teach them some more social graces.

It can be tricky for parents during the end of year festive and holiday season to guide children down a giving, let alone a responsibility to the wider community view path. So much attention is placed on receiving that it can be difficult to develop a sense of 'other' in children. It helps to be proactive and put rituals of generosity in place, which will inevitably become part of your family's traditions.

Here are some ideas to get you thinking:

- **1. Develop an action of gratitude** Discuss with children the people who have been helpful, kind or gone out of their way for them during the year. Then they can write a note, make a gift or cook something that they can give to those people to say thank you.
- **2. Make a family commitment of giving** Pick a cause that's close to your family's heart and make a commitment to do something or give something on a regular basis throughout the coming year.
- **3.** Involve kids in personal giving If gifts are shared as part of your tradition then do your best to involve children in the giving process. Discuss the choice of gifts: "So what do you think your cousin would like?". Even better, get your kids to accompany you on a shopping trip, if you dare.
- **4. Have a clean out** Approaching the festive season provides a great opportunity for kids to spring clean their toy, clothes and technology cupboards. Not only does this make room for the new, (and perhaps unfairly lift their expectations), but it provides the chance for children to pass on unwanted items to siblings, friends or others who would probably appreciate and use them more than they would.
- **5. Give them a social script** Children usually operate on a script learnt from their parents. If you want them to be thankful for their gifts then give them the lines they should use. Be prepared for some gentle parental cueing if in all the festive excitement they forget to say thanks.


Children from Prep to Grade 6 were treated to a FUNtastic show that was not only engaging and entertaining, but educational too!

Through story and song, students were exposed to background information and historical facts about some famous landmarks and places in Rome Including:


The Trevi Fountain, The Pantheon, Piazza Navona, Sistine Chapel, Stadio Olimpico (Olympic Stadium).




Impressions from the Preps



THE SECRET TO CONFIDENT KIDS excerpt from Michael Grose.

The first habit from Stephen Covey's wonderful book "The 7 habits of highly effective people" states that we should start every project or undertaking with the end in mind.

This principle holds true for any activity whether it's planting your vegie patch; renovating a house or raising children. When you know what you are trying to achieve then choosing the right strategies becomes easy.

The end game or goal for parents and teachers is Redundancy. Yep, you read it right. Your job is to make yourself redundant as an adult from the children you raise and teach at the earliest possible age. It always has been and always should be.

When redundancy is your aim most of your time, effort and energy will go into promoting independence. You'll stop doing things for kids and start giving them opportunities to do things themselves. You'll spend most of your active parenting and teaching time teaching, explaining and prodding your child toward independence.

Independence leads to the 4 C's . When independence becomes your priority then suddenly you've found a pathway to the development of other positive qualities and traits in your children including the key four - confidence, competence, creativity and character. Here's how:

Confidence comes from facing your fears and doing things for yourself.

Competence comes from the opportunity to develop self-mastery that independence offers.

Creativity is developed when kids solve problems themselves as opposed to someone solving them on their behalf, or worse, keeping kids safe. It's amazing how resourceful kids can be when they are given the chance to resolve their own problems.

Character, which is essential for success, is forged under hardship and is needed if kids are to live a sturdy life. Kids need to be exposed to disappointment, failure and conflict if character strengths such as grit and perseverance are too be forged.

Independence takes many forms

Adults are the gatekeepers for children's independence. And of course, independence takes many guises.

On a basic level it's about developing children's autonomy. Without realising it, many adults make choices on their children's behalf. Kids build self-confidence when they do things for themselves, and make their own decisions.

Independence is built when children spend time in unpredictable circumstances and environments and have the opportunity to navigate their neighbourhoods on their own. There maybe some risk involved but that is where the learning lay. Eliminate the risk and you eliminate the learning.

Allowing kids to follow their own impulses even if they are different to yours is the key to gaining independence. This may mean that children choose healthy interests and pursuits that adults are unfamiliar with, or even swim against the tide of their parents' wishes.

Allowing kids to take responsibility and own their own problems builds confidence and competence. Start by expecting kids to help out at home and at school. Look for ways to develop self-help skills and don't take their problems on as your problems.

Manage visually

When your end game is redundancy and your priority is independence building then managing your kids in a visual way becomes your most obvious strategy. Management by mouth is a dependency strategy so talk less, use signs, lists and rosters backed up consequences to develop independence and responsibility in your children.

Create junior versions of independence

It can be scary and also difficult developing independence in one big step. So smart adults intuitively develop junior versions of independence by breaking up big activities into digestible bits. Want your three year old to make the bed? Then start by arranging the teddies and the pillows (a junior version of making the bed) and let them work their way up from there. Similarly, want your five year old to walk to school yet it's currently out of his skillset? Then accompany him most of the way and let him walk the last 200 metres to school on his own. That's a junior version of walking to school.

In all the noise and commotion about raising kids today it's easy to forget that the job description for parents hasn't changed since the dawn of time. Love them, bond with them, teach them and spend time with them. But also work like mad to develop their real independence so they become capable of handling what life will throw their way.

This formula works just as well for teachers, and is perhaps easier as the emotional attachment isn't as strong




